A 2026 report published by [The News International](#) stated that Pakistan is home to approximately 4.6 million orphan children, while only a small percentage receive organized welfare support.

Economic instability, floods, and inflation have worsened the condition of the orphan children of Pakistan.



How many orphanages are in Pakistan?

Pakistan can't actually give you a firm count of its orphanages; it's a bit of a mess - lots are run by government departments, charities, and private welfare groups, and as you might expect, new ones keep popping up. But some of the big welfare networks give you a rough idea of what's going on. The Edhi Foundation, for example, runs around 18 orphanage homes across the country, which are home to about 8,500 kids. They're not the only ones giving it a go, though - SOS Children's Villages has places in 15+ districts all over the country, and Al-Khidmat Foundation supports thousands of kids who've lost their parents through their centers. At the same time, though, Pakistan is thought to be home to an eye-watering 4-4.6 million orphans - but unfortunately, only a tiny fraction of them actually end up in kind of institutional care. It's a pretty telling stat - even though there are hundreds of small and big orphan care centers dotted around the country, there are still loads more orphans out there who are having to rely on charity support from their local communities or NGOs just to get by.

Why Orphan Sponsorship Matters?

Orphan sponsorship is not simply child financial assistance, but it is an investment in a child's

When children reach stable support, they are more likely to remain in school, grow healthier and socially developed, and avoid child labor.

Children also need:

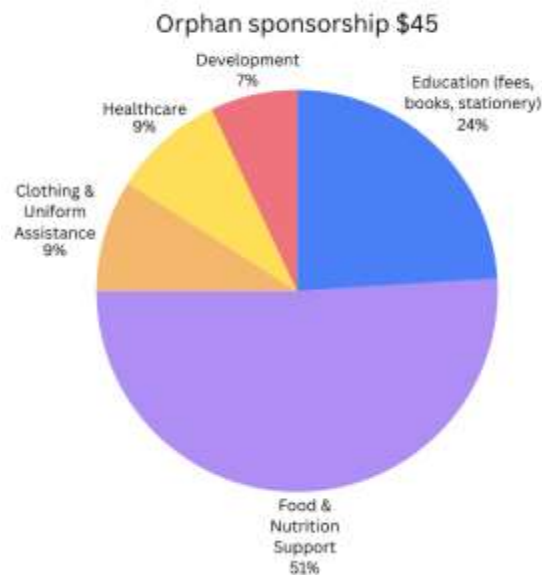
- Emotional care,

How much does it cost to sponsor an orphan?

The cost for average sponsorship for an orphan in Pakistan is \$45. This includes their education, healthcare, basic needs, psychological and social development charges. These are the charges to provide them with all the facilities within a reasonable range. For example, the good schools in Pakistan have a minimum monthly fee of \$20, but the budget for acceptable education is \$11, which is 24% of \$45. This support will help ensure that children receive the education and development needed to build a stable future and support their families with dignity.



The Educational Crisis in Pakistan

Currently, Pakistan has one of the world's highest numbers of out-of-school children.

UNICEF Pakistan Education Statistics report that an estimated 25.1 million children aged 5–16 are not attending school.

Balochistan faces particularly severe educational exclusion; a large number of students there don't have access to proper schooling.

For orphaned children, access to education can completely transform future opportunities and help break cycles of poverty.

How to sponsor an orphan in Islam?
